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## MENU: Twelve Angry Men Act I

Appetizer of Knowledge & Comprehension - Choose 10 questions/1pt each

Recall/Reproduction: Recall a fact, information, or procedure. Process information on a low level.

Key Verbs: define, describe, explain, give examples, identify, recall, state

- 1. In your own words, state what instructions the judge gives to the jurors. How many jurors must vote guilty for the accused to be convicted?
- 2. What do we know of the defendant? Of what is the defendant accused?
- 3. Name the four major pieces of evidence against the defendant.
- 4. Which juror is particularly anxious to make a quick decision? Why?
- 5. Which juror is the least confident of his vote?
- 6. Which juror votes "not guilty" and for what reason?
- 7. What is the cause of Three's anger toward all kids?
- 8. What comments do Seven, Three, and Four make about the defendant? Why does Five react as he does?
- 9. What happens to make the "knife theory" invalid?
- 10. What "proposition" does Juror Eight make on page 26? What is his motive for making the proposal?
- 11. Why does Nine change his vote? Who is Nine?
- 12. Eight makes a point about the passing el train that suggests a flaw in the old man's story. What point does he make?
- 13. What point does Eleven make about whether the boy was panicked or not panicked (39)?
- 14. Why does Three immediately look embarrassed after saying that the witness is an old man who is confused half of the time (43)?
- 15. How does Juror Eight disprove the old man's testimony of hearing the boy and seeing him run down the stairs?

Dinner of Application & Analysis - Choose 3 questions/3 pts each

Skill/Concept: Use information or conceptual knowledge, two or more steps.

Key Verbs: apply, calculate, categorize, classify, construct, interpret, predict, relate

- 1. What mood is established at the beginning of the play? (hint: think about how the jury room itself time and weather affects the jurors)
- 2. From what you have learned of the jurors thus far, who appears to be the protagonist in this play? Why? Who appears to be the antagonist? Why?

- 3. What does Ten reveal about himself with the following comment: "How can you believe him, knowing what he is? I lived among 'em all my life. You can't believe a word they say" (16)?
- 4. Juror Eight says he had a funny feeling about this trial—a feeling that something about the trial was unfair. What does he think was wrong?
- 5. Nine thinks the old man might have said what he said in order to get attention, not because he actually heard anything. What led him to this conclusion?
- 6. Regarding the defendant, Ten states, "Bright! He's a common ignorant slob. He don't even speak good English!" (36). What is ironic about this statement?
- 7. On what dramatic note does this act end? What makes the dramatic climax so significant?

## Dessert of Synthesis - Choose 2 questions/10 pts each

Strategic Thinking: Requires reasoning, developing a plan or a sequence of steps, some complexity. Key Verbs: assess, cite evidence, compare, contrast, defend, explain how, justify

- 1. It is very important to note that the defendant was accused of murdering his father. This relationship becomes very important in how Jurors 3 & 8 understand the accused. How does each juror (3 &8) identify with the accused? How does this affect his thinking and his actions? Provide evidence from the text.
- 2. No names are used throughout the play. The jurors are simply referred to as a number. What purpose does the anonymity of this play serve in regards to the characters?
- 3. Identify two-three examples of prejudice/stereotypes found in the play. What does the prejudice/stereotype reveal about the person himself and/or society at that time?
- 4. The plays shows us a man's world where men do everything and women do little more than serve as witnesses. List two-three instances in the play where a woman's perspective many have made a difference and explain why.

## Midnight Snack of Evaluation - Choose 1 question

Extended Thinking: Requires an investigation, time to think and process multiple conditions of the problem.

Key Verbs: appraise, connect, create, critique, design, judge, prove, report

- 1. How does *Twelve Angry Men* relate to Lauryn Hill's "Mystery of Iniquity" and/or Article of the Week's "Millennials doubt fairness"? Make two-three connections between the play and the lyrics or article.
- 2. How would you feel if you were Juror 8? Everyone is against you; would you be able to hold your own as calmly as he? Provide two-three examples of times when you were calm in the face of ridicule or opposition.
- 3. This play is in many ways a multi-generational play, featuring men of many different age groups; this coupled with the fact that the play is all-male definitely embeds the patriarchy of the times as well. What stereotypes about fathers and about teenagers played a role in the mindset of the jury and are still applicable in today's society?
